






1. Celebrating Independence and National Identity:

This right is enshrined in international agreements such as the Convention on Biological Diversity, which recognizes the authority of nations to manage and sustainably use their biological resources.


By exercising this right, PNG can make decisions that align with its cultural perspectives, local knowledge, and sustainable development goals.
